23 RULES OF COLLEGE ETIQUETTE

RESPECT AND FOLLOW OUR SCHOOL'S HONOR CODE

This is the most important rule of all. Don't cheat and don't steal information. Cheating can occur in many forms-from copying a paper a friend turned in a semster before to stealing music off of the Internet.

GO TO CLASS AND GET THERE ON TIME

It is disrespectful to your professor and sitracting to your classmates to walk into a class or lecture late. You need to do everything you can to avoid missing class. If you don't think the professor has something valuable to teach you about the subject, then don't take the class.

BE PREPARED FOR CLASS AND BE AN ACTIVE PARTICIPANT

When professors give reading assignments for the next class, they expect that you will have read the material prior to when you arrive. If you have a question about the topic in the lecture, raise your hand, wait to be called on, and ask the question. More than likely, others are confused about the same point and will appreciate you asking the question.

DON'T MONOPOLIZE THE DISCUSSION

Inevitably, in every class, there is one person who wants to comment on every single topic. This person will normally have his or her hand raised during the entire class and also will want to talk to the professor afterward. Don't be this person. Give other people a chance to speak and ask questions. You will learn from them.

USE SOCIAL MEDIA CAREFULLY

Remember that anything you put on the Web is public–even if you have to approve friends to see your page. What may seem appropriate now– making fun of an organization or photos of you after too many drinks at a party–may not be appropriate later. Remember that professors, employers and graduate schools have access to these Web pages, too. You don't want your election for U.S. senator to be marred by your former behavior.

NEVER TYPE SOMETHING YOU WOULDN'T OR SHOULDN'T SAY

Sometimes it is easy to sit at your computer and write a harsh e-mail to a friend or professor. Remember that tone is hard to read in an e-mail and that face-to-face communication is always better. If you wouldn't say it to a professor or friend's face, then don't assume it is appropriate for e-mail either.

DON'T TALK TO YOUR FRIENDS IN CLASS

You are in class to learn, not to socialize. If you are taking a class with friends, try to sit alone so you won't be distracted. If you do sit with friends, remember this—it is rude to laugh and talk during class. You'll bring attention to yourselves that you will not want. Most likely, the professor will call on you more or evaluate your class participation grade lower.

TURN OFF THE GADGETS

(Cell Phone, iPhone, Black-Berry, internet)

It is fine to take notes on a laptop (try to type quietly), but it is not fine for your cell phone to ring during lecture. It is not OK to send text messages during class. And, you shouldn't be playing Internet poker during Psychology 101, either.

DON'T TALK ABOUT OR COMPLAIN ABOUT GRADES

The best rule to follow here is to treat grades as personal and private. Don't obsess about them before a test, and don't compare them after a test. Nothing good can ever come of talking about grades. If you got a better grade, you'll make the other person feel bad. If the other person did, he or she will make you feel bad. Just remember, not every person is a straight-A student. You may know that you excel in the humanities, but math and science are challenging for you. Comparing grades will only make you or others feel terrible.

KEEP YOUR COMMITMENTS

Make commitments carefully, and once you make them, keep them. This is especially important when working on group projects and in organizations. If people are depending on you, you need to be worthy of their trust.

DON'T GO TO A PROFESSOR'S OFFICE HOURS TO LOBBY FOR A BETTER GRADE

CONEY MESSAGES PROMPTLY

KEEPING YOUR PARENTS INFORMED

As your prepare to go to college, you are probably excited or anxious, or both. You have had your parents to help you the last several years, so you will probably plan to rely on them during your adventure at college. Parents are a perfect sounding board for ideas and for administering advice. Sometimes, parents can be too involved in your college experience. Here are some ideas about how to set boundaries on what you should and should not ask your parents to do.

SET UP A SCHEDULE FOR CHECKING IN

Talk to your parents before you go to college about when you will talk and how you will communicate. Your parents might be fearful that you are basically going off into the jungle. Giving them set times to hear from you will reassure them that you are not gone forever. A good idea is to agree to talk every other day or every third day. Some students like to send an e-mail to parents every other day that says, "I'm doing fine. Don't worry." Of course, you can tell them more if you want to, but at least this way, they will know you are alive and kicking.

In addition, it's a good idea to have a "date" each week for a lengthy conversation about what all has happened at MSU. Sunday nights are often a great time for you and your parents to talk about everything. It might even become a ritual for you to talk about the past week to prepare for the upcoming week. Know that if you set a time with your parents, you need to stick to it. They will really look forward to hearing from you.

CALL YOUR PARENTS ON THE GOOD DAYS

When things go wrong–and things will go wrong–you are going to want to call home. Do it. Call home and get advice about how to mend the relationship with your roommate, how to study harder for the next exam, and how to change a flat tire. But, remember to call home on the good days, too. A lot of times when you are hanging out with friends, joining fun organizations, and doing well in class, you don't call home. Things are going so well that you don't need support. Your parents want to know when you do well just as much as they want to know when you need help. Call and tell them.

ASK YOUR PARENTS BEFORE YOU BRING A FRIEND OR SIGNIFICANT OTHER ALONG

A lot of times when your parents come to campus for a night or a weekend, they are desperate to spend some time alone with you. The same thing is true for when you go home for the weekend. If you bring a buddy to tag along, it's hard for your parents to feel like they really got to spend quality time with you. WEEKENDS AT HOME

You'll stay out late catching up and partying until 2 or 3 a.m., then sleep until noon on Saturday. That afternoon, you want to go by the mall to get a new shirt for the upcoming game. Saturday night, you want to go to the movies and then on Sunday you'll leave early to get back for a group study session. To prevent this, talk to your parents before you get home. You'll be glad you did.

MSU TRADITIONS

THE BULLDOG

Mississippi State University athletic teams are called Bulldogs, a name earned and maintained over the decades by the tough, tenacious play of student-athletes wearing the maroon and white. The official school mascot is an American Kennel Clubregistered English bulldog, given the inherited title of "Bully."

As with most universities, State teams answered to different nicknames through the years. The first squads representing Mississippi A&M College were proud to be called Aggies, and when the school officially became Mississippi State College in 1932, the nickname Maroons, for State's uniform color, gained prominence. Bulldogs became the official title for State teams in 1961, not long after State College was granted university status. Yet, references to school teams and athletes as Bulldogs actually go back to early in the century, and this nickname was used almost interchangeably with both Aggies and Maroons, since at least 1905.

On Nov. 30 of that year, the A&M football team shut out their arch-rivals from the University of Mississippi 11-0 in Jackson. The campus newspaper, The Reflector, reported: "After the game, filled with that emotion that accompanies every great victory, there was nothing left for the cadets to do but to complete the great victory by showing sympathy for the dead athletic spirit of the University, by having a military funeral parade.

"A coffin was secured, decorated with University colors and a bulldog pup placed on top. It was then placed on the shoulders of a dozen cadets, and the procession started down Capitol Street, preceded by the band playing a very pathetic funeral march."

Other newspaper reports of the victory commented on the "bulldog" style of play by the A&M 11, and the bulldog was soon publicly accepted as a school athletic symbol. Accounts of a 1926 pep rally in Meridian had another bulldog parading with students

Use as an official game mascot began in 1935 when Coach Maj. Ralph Sasse, on "orders" from his team, went to Memphis, Tenn., to select a bulldog. Ptolemy, a gift of the Edgar Webster family, was chosen and the Bulldogs promptly defeated Alabama 20-7. A litter mate of Ptolemy became the first mascot called "Bully" shortly after Sasse's team beat mighty Army 13-7 at West Point that same year, perhaps the greatest victory in MSU football history. But Bully I earned more fame the hard way when, in 1939, a campus bus cut short his career- and his life. Days of campus mourning followed, as Bully lay in state in a glass coffin. A halfmile funeral procession accompanied by the Famous Maroon Band and three ROTC battalions went to Scott Field where Bully was buried under the bench at the 50yard line. Even LIFE Magazine covered the event. Other Bullys have since been buried at campus dorms, fraternity houses and also at the football stadium.

For years, Bully was a target for kidnappers, the last incident occurring prior to the 1974 State-Ole Miss game. The Bulldog team won anyway, 31- 13. While early Bullys once roamed campus freely or lived in fraternities, today the official university mascot is housed at the College of Veterinary Medicine when not on duty at State home football games. For all their fierce appearance and reputation, today's mascot bulldogs are good-natured, friendly animals and favorites with children. A student wearing a bulldog suit, also answering to Bully, is part of the MSU cheerleading team and assists in stirring up State spirit at games and pep rallies.



THE COWBELL

The most unique, and certainly the most resounding symbol of Mississippi State University tradition, is the cowbell. Despite decades of attempts by opponents and authorities to banish it from scenes of competition, diehard State fans still celebrate Bulldog victories loudly and proudly with the distinctive sound of ringing cowbells. The precise origin of the cowbell as a fixture of Mississippi State sports tradition remains unclear to this day. The best records have cowbells gradually introduced to the MSU sports scene in the late 1930s and early 1940s, coinciding with the "golden age" of Mississippi State football success prior to World War II.

The most popular legend is that during a home football game between State and arch-rival Mississippi, a Jersey cow wandered onto the playing field. Mississippi State soundly whipped the Rebels that Saturday, and State College students immediately adopted the cow as a good luck charm. Students are said to have continued bringing a cow to football games for a while, until the practice was eventually discontinued in favor of bringing just the cow's bell.

Whatever the origin, it is certain that by the 1950s, cowbells were common at Mississippi State games, and by the 1960s were established as the special symbol of Mississippi State. In the 1960s, two MSU professors, Earl W. Terrell and Ralph L. Reeves, obliged some students by welding handles on the bells so they could be rung with much more convenience and authority. By 1963, the demand for these long-handled cowbells could not be filled by home workshops alone, so at the suggestion of Reeves, the Student Association bought bells in bulk and the Industrial Education Club agreed to weld on handles.

Today, many styles of cowbells ware available on campus and around Starkville, with the top-of-the-line a heavy chrome plated model with a full Bulldog figurine handle. But experts insist the best and loudest results are produced by a classic long-handled, bicycle-grip bell made of thinner and tightly-welded shells. Cowbells decorate offices and homes of Mississippi State alumni, and are passed down through generations of Bulldog fans. But, they are not heard at Southeastern Conference games-not legally, at least-since the 1974 adoption of a conference rule against "artificial noisemakers" at football and basketball games. This has done little harm to the cowbell's popularity, however, or to prevent cowbells from being heard outside stadiums in which the Bulldogs are playing. They can still be heard at non-conference football contests, as well as other sporting events on campus.

MSU DICTIONARY

ADD/DROP: The process by which you can add or remove a class from your schedule.

ADVISOR: Person who helps you select coursework and can refer you to the appropriate campus services.

AC: Area Coordinator; professional member of housing and residence life.

BLOCK: A meal on the dining plan.

BULLDOG BASH: Largest free outdoor concert in Mississippi. Begins with a pep rally and is followed by several musical acts. Located in Downtown Starkville.

BULLYMAIL: The university assigns every student an official e-mail address of netid@msstate.edu and uses this e-mail address for official communication with students

CANVAS: Learning management system (LMS) used for online instruction.

CANVAS STUDENT MOBILE APP: Allows access to Canvas courses from mobile devices.

CD: Community Director; professional member of housing and residence life.

CSA: Center for Student Activities. Located in the Colvard Student Union, Room 314, and is responsible for student organizations, Student Association, and Music Maker Productions.

DAVIS WADE: The Davis Wade Stadium is home to MSU Football.

DAWG DAYS: Welcome events for all MSU students. Begins with MVNU2MSU (residence hall move-in day) and continues through the first few days of school.

DIFFERENCE OF ONE: An online portal with 300 student organizations one.msstate.edu.

DOWNTOWN DAWG: Shuttle bus operating on Friday and Saturday nights. Takes students from campus to various locations in Starkville.

THE DRILL: Traditional welcome event held on the Drill Field during the first week of classes each year.

DRILL FIELD: Grass lawn in the heart of the MSU campus. Built in 1909, it is anchored by Lee Hall on the north, and the Swalm Chemical Engineering building (a mirror image of Lee Hall) on the south.

DUDY NOBLE: The Dudy Noble Baseball Field.

FLEX DOLLARS: A method of payment that is included in most meal plans and can be used at any Dining Services operation on campus.

HOLD: If you have been notified that a hold has been placed on your records, you will need to determine the cause of the hold and remedy the situation in order to register for class. Common reasons for holds are: financial (not paying your myState account) or administrative (academic performance).

THE HUMP: Humphrey Coliseum. Home of MSU basketball.

ITS: Information Technology Services.

LIVING-LEARNING COMMUNITIES: Residence hall communities shared by students with common interests. Examples: Shackouls Honors College and Day One.

MVNU2MSU: Movin' You to MSU. Opening day in the residence halls.

MSU ID CARD: is key to accessing goods and services, including MoneyMate, meal plans, sporting events and electronic class attendance.

MSU DICTIONARY

MSU FALL CONVOCATION: A convocation program emphasizing the importance of academics with the goal of each student being successful in college and life.

MUSIC MAKERS: Student organization responsible for MSU concerts.

MYBANNER: System that provides online registrations, payment of fees and access to your records.

MYSTATE: Online portal that offers access to MyBanner, WebCT courses and university e-mail accounts.

NAVIGATORS: MSU students who help freshmen navigate through their first year at MSU.

NETID: A unique letter and number combination assigned to you by the university. Found on the front of your MSU ID card. ex. abc123.

MYSTATE MOBILE: available at no cost for both iOS and Android devices. The app provides access to general information such as campus maps and directions, shuttle routes, and the campus directory.

NETPASSWORD: used in conjunction with a NetID when logging in to MSU systems.

NIGHT ROUTE: Shuttle bus operating on Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights. Takes students from campus to various locations in Starkville.

ORGSYNC: OrgSync is the way to connect to organizations and communicate with other members, one msstate.edu

PARENT PORTAL: access to view a summary of their academic information including class schedule, grades, absences, account balance, financial aid, and meal plan use.

QUIKPAY®: System that allows you and your authorized users (parents) to make online payments to your account.

REGISTRAR: Office that handles transcripts, academic calendars, academic records, and more.

RA: Resident Advisor. Undergraduate student living on each floor of the residence hall.

RD: Residence Director. Graduate student who manages the day-to-day operations of the residence hall.

SA: Student Association. Student body government at MSU.

S.M.A.R.T.: The Starkville MSU Area Rapid Transit is a free fixed route shuttle service. smart.msstate.edu

THE REFLECTOR: MSU student newspaper. Published each Tuesday and Friday during the school year.

THE UNION: Colvard Student Union. Home to many aspects of student life, including several food vendors and the offices of many campus organizations.

TWO-FACTOR AUTHENTICATION (DUO): Two-factor authentication adds another layer of security when logging in to MSU systems. The first factor required to login is something you know, i.e. your NetID/NetPassword. The second factor is something you have, typically your smartphone or tablet.

WMSV: MSU's radio station. 91.1 FM.

MSU students are treated as adults and the university complies fully with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, typically referred to as F.E.R.P.A., which protects student records. Students may view their grades by logging into their university account. While parents should encourage their student to share the grades, federal law makes records distribution illegal to any person other than the student.

Although a student may access his or her own university records, with limited exception, the university will not disclose, without prior consent, record information to anyone, including parents.

However, students may authorize MSU to grant a parent or family member access to certain educational records through the University's Parent Portal online system. After reviewing details on page 51, contact the Office of Parent & Family Services at 662.325.3611 or family@msstate.edu to obtain help in navigating this process.

A student may restrict the release of his or her basic contact information published annually in the campus and online directories. Those desiring to restrict directory information may do so online at **my.msstate.edu**.

STUDENT **CONDUCT**

The Dean of Students' Office (DOS) is responsible for adjudicating cases of alleged individual and organizational violations of the code of student conduct.

The DOS staff addresses behavior in a manner consistent with core values of fairness, honesty and integrity while promoting the university's educational mission. Our mission is to promote responsibility and standards of conduct for Mississippi State students through a fair and objective process. By fostering concepts of fairness, civility and encouraging personal responsibility, we are striving to ensure a safe and healthy university community by:

- Administering the Code of Student Conduct while ensuring the principles of due process.
- Serving as a consultant and resource for students, faculty, staff and parents concerning student conduct expectations and rights including university policies and procedures related to student life.
- Assisting and counseling victims and those accused of conduct violations.
- Offering conflict and dispute management.

ALCOHOL AND DRUGS

Reports of possible policy violations and other alcohol-related incidents are forwarded to the Dean of Students' Office. Students found to have violated the alcohol policy may be required to attend alcohol education classes, undergo individual alcohol assessments, perform community service, and/or have their parents or legal guardians notified. The office also notifies parents in alcohol and drug cases in which an involved student is under the age of 21.

Students are coming to an environment in which they will likely be exposed to alcohol and other drugs. Some may not make the smartest choices in dealing with related situations that may arise. DOS staff members are available to both you and your student for discussion of any issue.

CAMPUS CONDUCT PROCESS

While parents never want their child to get in trouble, college students occasionally put themselves in situations where they may interact with the campus conduct process. Below are some things to know about the differences between campus and criminal justice processes.

Because the Dean of Students' Office strives to provide an atmosphere that is both supportive and welcoming, the campus conduct process is much less formal than criminal proceedings. Our actions are intended to be educational rather than punitive. It should be noted that cases involving more serious charges tend to be accompanied by a more formal process in an effort to protect the students' rights.

Charges involving alleged violations of the MSU Code of Student Conduct may or may not be violations of local, state or federal law. Because campus conduct and criminal justice processes are not mutually exclusive, a student may be charged in both the criminal justice and campus conduct systems.

Campus conduct cases are confidential, in compliance with the federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act. On the other hand, criminal records are public records, and information in them may be shared with the larger community.

The standard of information in determining a student violation is not as high as those for the criminal process. In this regard, legal rules of evidence, whether something is admissible, do not apply in campus conduct cases. The hearing officer will gather and utilize any information that is deemed relevant.

Students do not have the right to attend Mississippi State University; rather, it is a privilege. Removal of a student from campus through a sanction of suspension or dismissal is a possibility in certain circumstances.

A student is entitled to an advisor, but that advisor may not represent the student in proceedings. Students are expected to speak for themselves at all times during the process, and an advisor that disregards this rule will be asked to leave the room. Some students may face the MSU Conduct Board. Made up entirely of students, this body makes recommendations to the Dean of Students regarding sanctions for committed violations.

All parents of Mississippi State students who are under 21 years old and found guilty of violating the university's alcohol or drug policies will receive a notification letter stating the violation.





HOUSING AND RESIDENCE LIFE

Residence halls at Mississippi State offer the opportunity to meet new friends, get involved, and experience educational and social events. As part of MSU's commitment to academic success, we require first-time freshmen to live on-campus in residence halls.

Housing and Residence Life Staff: Our department's staff is dedicated and trained to assist students during their transition to college life. Information Assistants (IAs) are trained student workers who work at the front desk of each residence hall. Our front desks are open seven days a week during the academic term. Resident Advisors (RAs) are trained student workers who live on each hallway and provide support to residents. Community Directors (CDs) are full-time staff and Graduate Residence Directors (GRDs) are graduate student staff who live in the building to oversee day-to-day residence life, supervise the RAs and provide support to students living in their building. CDs and GRDs have office hours. Students are encouraged to visit with their RA, GRD, or CD. The department also employs a variety of support and professional staff to make the student-living experience at Mississippi State an exceptional one. Maintenance Requests/Fix-Its: If a student finds something in their room is broken or needs attention, they can submit a fix-it ticket online at any time by logging on to my.housing.msstate.edu, their housing portal.

Safety and Security: The safety and security of students is of the utmost importance. Residents must have their MSU ID card to access the residence halls 24 hours a day. Card readers use MSU ID cards to allow those residents who live in that hall, or in some instances, on the specific floor to enter the building, floor, or hallway. Guests must use the front entrance, check-in at the front desk, and be escorted by their host at all times.

Visitation: Visitation hours are from 10 a.m. to 2 a.m., Monday-Sunday. Violation of the visitation policy may result in the loss of visitation privilege. Students who would like to have overnight guests of the same sex must request an overnight guest form from their front desk and have their roommate and Resident Advisor (RA) sign/approve it.

Roommates and Room Changes: The opportunity for students to experience a college roommate is exciting and significant. As with most situations in life, there will be ups and downs. We encourage students to communicate often and face-to-face with their roommate. There are times when students find themselves looking for a new roommate or wanting a room change. If this happens, students are encouraged to meet with their Resident Advisor (RA) first, then the Graduate Residence Director (GRD)/Community Director (CD) to explore all options.

Kitchens: Our residence halls have common kitchens for students to use. Kitchens are available for use 24/7. Most hall front desks have pots and pans available for students to check out. Students are expected to clean up after each use.

Vending Areas: There are snack and beverage vending machines in common areas of each residence hall. Most vending machines accept cash, coins, and credit/debit cards.

Laundry: Washing machines and dryers are provided in each residence hall for students' convenience. The cost is \$1.50 per cycle. Students can pay by quarters, credit or debit card, and/or bank-issued gift cards. Laundry rooms are open 24/7 and can be used by students at any time. Students are encouraged to use the app WaveRider to load money to use the washers and dryers, see what units are open, and receive notifications when the laundry cycle is finished.

Ice Machines: There are ice machines in each residence hall students can access at any time. Ice makers are not provided in the freezers of the refrigerators in student rooms.

Additional Furniture: Students are welcome to bring items that will make the space in their rooms feel like home. Please remember if you are bringing any type of additional furniture, the furniture or items the Department of Housing and Residence Life provides in the room may not be removed. There is a microwave and a refrigerator provided in each residence hall room for student use. Students are not allowed to bring in additional microwaves or refrigerators.

Lock-outs/Keys: Depending on which residence hall a student is living in, they will either use their MSU Student ID or a university-issued hard key to access their room. If a key is lost or stolen, the resident is responsible for reporting it to the GRD/CD and for paying a lock change fee. Because of the security risk, it is important to report lost keys immediately. Residents will be charged each time a staff member must open a door because of a forgotten or misplaced MSU Student ID or key.

Internet Access: Students have access to university Wi-Fi and Ethernet in their residence hall room. There are no additional charges for this service and it is included as part of a student's housing rates. Wireless routers are not permitted.

Mail and Packages: There are detailed instructions, residence hall addresses, and information about service providers on our website regarding sending and receiving mail and packages. We encourage you to read more at housing.msstate.edu/residence-halls/mail prior to sending students' mail or packages.





Other Policies and Procedures: The Department of Housing and Residence Life and Mississippi State University have a number of policies and procedures that are important and relevant to a student's time on campus. We encourage you to become familiar with them. More information regarding those policies can be found at **students.msstate.edu** and **housing.msstate.edu**. Updates/edits are often made to policies and procedures.

Breaks: The residence halls are open from fall opening day to spring closing day except during the university's Winter Break. If a student is interested or needs to stay during the Winter Break they are welcome to apply for Winter Break Housing through the housing portal. More information regarding breaks and check-out processes can be found on our website.

RSVP: Current residents who wish to continue living in university housing after their first year can apply through the Renewal Selection Verification Process (RSVP). Students can apply for RSVP through their housing portal to request to live on campus for the upcoming academic year, then participate in online room selection.





MAIL AND PACKAGE DELIVERY SERVICES

All students residing on campus are strongly encouraged to have a United States Postal Service (USPS) box to receive mail and packages sent via the carrier. To obtain a box, a student must complete an application and turn it in to USPS staff. Two forms of identification are required to apply. Students may also apply online at **usps.com** using zip code 39762. Fees begin at \$65, depending on the box size, and two keys are provided to each box holder.

TIPS FOR NAVIGATING Bulldog bundle

- All undergraduate students, excluding Gulf Coast Engineering, are automatically enrolled and provided access to all required textbooks, lab manuals, access codes and electronic book versions in a convenient bundle before the first day of class.
- All electronic books and access codes will be delivered through the student's Canvas page. All printed titles can be picked up in store or shipped to an address provided for a small fee.
- All printed books, not listed as consumables, will be a rental on the student's account and must be returned by the last day of finals.
- Cost of the Bulldog Bundle is \$20 per credit hour and will be applied to the student's account at the same time tuition is charged.
- Students will receive an email 30 days before classes start reminding them to verify and reserve their textbooks. At this time, students can choose to opt-out if they believe the program is not the best cost efficient option for them this semester.
- If students do opt-out and change their mind, they have until the last day to add a course to enter back into the program.
- Downloading the My College Bookstore app will enable the tracking of online orders, as well as receiving rental reminders and B&N special offers.

Freshmen are automatically enrolled in the Ultimate Meal Plan. In addition to the top 3 Meal Plans, freshmen who pledge a Greek organization have the additional option of choosing the Bronze or Greek Meal Plan. Meal Plans are a two-semester commitment.

Block Meals are primarily used at campus Residential Dining Halls. One swipe of the student ID will provide an all-you-care-to-eat meal. Flex Dollars, a declining balance on the student ID, are redeemable at all MSU Dining locations on campus. Block Meals expire at the end of each semester, but Flex Dollars roll over from fall to spring before expiring. Students can now download the **Transact Mobile Ordering** App to make mobile purchases with their Block Meals & Flex Dollars. Credit and debit cards are also accepted.

Meal Equivalency enables students to use a Block Meal at certain retail locations twice per day. Meal Exchange is a Block Meal that can be used at P.O.D Markets for a set "pick 3" meal. Time periods for both are 4 p.m. - 9 p.m. and again from 9 p.m. to midnight. Having these options essentially adds more Flex Dollars and variety to the Meal Plan.

The Office of the Registrar is responsible for the academic records, academic calendar, examination schedules, an undergraduate bulletin, master class schedule, course articulation, and undergraduate readmission. In addition, the office provides transcripts and degree and enrollment verifications.

Prior to a new semester, all students must register online through their Banner account accessed via **my.msstate.edu**. Students should complete their own registration process. Any questions about course selection should be directed to the assigned academic advisor who will, in turn, release the student to register for the next semester.

Registration holds are put in place for various reasons to prevent students from being able to register for classes. To remedy the situation, an affected student first must determine the cause by contacting the office issuing the hold.

SCHEDULE CHANGES

Students may add/drop a class by accessing their university Banner account via **my.msstate.edu**. During the fall and spring, a student has through 11:59 p.m. of the semester's 5th class day to drop a course and until 5 p.m. of the 6th class day to add a course, without being assessed a fee or academic penalty. After the fifth class day and through the 36th class day, the decision to drop a course requires the approval of a student's academic advisor. In addition, a "W grade"

will be entered on his or her academic record and a fee assessed.

After the 36th class day, a course may not be dropped except in documented cases of serious illness, extreme hardship or failure of the instructor to provide a significant assessment of academic performance. Also, the request to drop a course after the 36th class day must receive the approval of both a student's advisor and academic dean. Any student permitted to drop will receive a "W grade" on the academic record, be assessed a fee after the last day to drop, and have tuition costs applied.

- For most students, the campus will be Starkville.
- If known, choose a desired subject. (example: EN – English)
- Advanced Search options are available to refine your search.

STUDENT COURSE LOAD

INCOMPLETE GRADES

A grade of Incomplete, or "I", may be submitted in lieu of a final grade when the student, because of illness, death in the immediate family or similar circumstances beyond control, is unable to complete the course requirements or take final examinations.

The decision to issue an "I grade" rests solely with the faculty member of record for the course.

An undergraduate student receiving an "I grade" then must complete all work within 30 calendar days from the date of the next enrollment. A student receiving an "I grade" may make up only that part of coursework not completed because of an emergency.

If not resolved into a passing grade within the allotted time, the "I grade" will become an F.

If an undergraduate student then does not enroll in the university within a year of receiving an "I grade", it converts to a permanent grade of "WI" and the opportunity to change that grade will have passed.

ACADEMIC FORGIVENESS, OR COURSE-RETAKE, POLICY

For specific regulations and instructions on academic forgiveness, or course retakes, students should contact the Office of the Registrar or refer to the Academic Operating Policy on Undergraduate Academic Forgiveness (AOP 12.20). This policy will be applied only to courses taken at Mississippi State University.

CLASS ATTENDANCE

University class attendance is strongly correlated to student success, with numerous studies indicating how students with two or fewer absences tend to make higher grades and are more successful than those with more absences. Mississippi State freshmen repeatedly are encouraged to attend every class and make every effort to not be absent. The Academic Operating Policy on Class Attendance is (AOP 12.09).



WITHDRAWAL

A student leaving the university prior to the end of the period of enrollment, except for temporary absences, should initiate the withdrawal procedure by accessing their university Banner account via **my.msstate.edu**. Completion of this simple procedure will help prevent difficulties when obtaining transcripts and re-entering the university. It also avoids having a grade of "F" automatically recorded for all courses taken during the semester.

A student withdrawing after the 10th class day will receive a "W grade" for each course scheduled. Withdrawals are not allowed during the last two weeks before final examinations begin in the fall and spring semesters. This also applies during the final week prior to beginning examinations for each five week/ten week summer term.

In highly unusual circumstances resulting from extreme hardship, a student may petition to withdraw retroactively from a semester within one calendar year. The request for withdrawal will be considered only when accompanied by appropriate documentation of the situation (e.g., medical emergency or administrative error) that relates to academic performance during the recorded semester in question. Such requests must be approved by the student's advisor, department head and academic dean, as well as the university provost. For cases other than administrative error in which final grades were recorded, a student's instructors should be consulted before a final decision is rendered and should be notified after the decision. is made. In no case will more than one semester's work be retroactively withdrawn during a student's matriculation at Mississippi State.

ACADEMIC ADVISING

Each student is assigned an academic advisor. Students are able to locate their academic advisor information (if available) by logging into their myState student portal. Students are expected to become familiar with the requirements for their majors, to know how to access online campus resources, to know who their advisors are and to meet regularly with them. Advisors are available to assist students in processes such as adding and/or dropping courses, as well as providing general education information and help seeking career advice.

An academic advising period is held each semester prior to the registration period. During the advising period, which generally lasts about two weeks, students should schedule an appointment to meet with their advisor regarding course selections for the upcoming semester. Students cannot register until they have been released by their advisor.

For many students, transitioning from high school to college means moving from a relatively controlled and directed environment to one with a great deal of freedom. Success in this new environment requires a well-developed sense of personal responsibility. For many freshmen the first challenge they face is to be personally responsible about attending class regularly. Pathfinders encourages regular class attendance and also intervenes when a freshman begins missing class. Residence Hall Assistants meet one-on-one with freshmen accumulating absences early in the semester. The contact is non-confrontational and emphasizes the need for personal responsibility and talking with their instructor and advisor if they are having difficulty.

WHAT ARE SOME TIPS TO HELP MY STUDENT SUCCEED IN CLASS?

Most students who exhibit poor academic performance and/or withdraw from MSU find themselves having academic difficulties very early during their first semester.

The most effective steps that students can take to increase their chances of success in college include:

- Go to class. Students should not miss classes, even during the first days of the semester.
- If a class is missed, the instructor should be notified, and the absence explained.
- Find out what is expected and how performance will be evaluated.
- Meet with instructors if any material or requirements are unclear or confusing.
- Most situations or requests are covered by one or more Mississippi State policies.

- Students should review policies early in their academic career and consult them when questions arise.

Financial assistance to help pay for higher education comes primarily in the following forms:

- Grants and scholarships that don't have to be repaid.
- Loans, borrowed money that must be paid back.
- Federal Work-Study program to help cover expenses besides tuition and room and board, including books, supplies, transportation, etc.

Also, MSU's Center for America's Veterans was created to assist students that are current or former members of the military or their dependents. For complete information about veteran and military education benefits, contact the center at 662,325,6719 or veterans.msstate.edu.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Students must be admitted to MSU in order to apply for scholarships. Once admitted, students should log in to their myState account, then complete, save, and submit the General Scholarship Application. After submitting this general application, additional opportunities may be recommended in your myState account based on your test scores, GPA, leadership and service, and applicant record. More opportunities, like departmental scholarships, may become available over time.



GRANTS

Grants provided to students by federal, state and institutional organizations are awarded on the basis of a family's financial need. The State of Mississippi provides several for state residents not based on financial need and in amounts that may vary each year. To apply each year:

- Fill out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid form.
- Mississippi resident students also should complete the online application at msfinancialaid.org.

Other sources of scholarships and financial assistance may be available through hometown clubs, churches and community organizations.

LOANS

Major federal student loans at MSU include:

- Federal Direct Stafford Loans (subsidized, based on financial need; unsubsidized, not based on financial need)
- Federal Direct PLUS Loan (credit based loan program for a dependent student's parents.)

On some loans, students may choose not to make payments while enrolled at least half-time. Student borrowers must start repaying loans, however, after leaving school or dropping below half-time enrollment status. Students may choose to pay interest only while in school on the Direct Unsubsidized Stafford loan. Students qualifying for a loan will find out through the award letter. After the offer is accepted, completion of additional forms will be required. The award letter and MSU Student Financial Aid website at **sfa.msstate.edu** will provide details.

WORK-STUDY AND STUDENT JOBS

Work-study and student jobs taking place part-time on campus are additional ways to help offset educational expenses. Some tips here include:

- A parent and student should submit FAFSAs early.
- Any amount for which the student qualifies will be indicated in the award letter and is the maximum amount that may be earned through the Federal Work-Study Program during the school year.
- A typical work week usually involves 10-15 hours.
- Overtime shouldn't be considered since a student cannot earn more than the amount listed in the award letter.
- Since paychecks are issued semi-monthly, students should ensure the money goes to good use (for instance, textbooks instead of snacks).
- Because it covers hours actually worked during the previous pay period, the semi-monthly paycheck will not be available at the beginning of the semester for tuition and other charges.
- Within the first three workdays, a student must provide the employing office with an original passport, Social Security card or birth certificate, along with the student ID card/or driver's license.

HOW TO APPLY FOR AID

COMPLETE THE 2022-23 FREE APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL STUDENT AID (FAFSA)

To apply for federal and state financial aid, first complete the 2022-23 Free Application for Federal Student Aid, the primary form for all types of federal aid, as well as some state and institutional aids. The steps to complete the FAFSA include:

 Both parent and student will need to use their 2020 federal tax return information when completing the 2022-23 FAFSA. It is highly recommended that parents

- and students use the IRS Data Retrieval Tool (DTR) when completing the income section on the DTR.
- Before beginning the FAFSA, go to studentaid.gov and create a U.S. Department of Education Federal Student Aid identification. (Because the FSA ID is used as an electronic signature on the FAFSA, both student and parent must apply for an FSA ID.)
- Once the FSA IDs are received, complete the 2022-23 FAFSA on the same studentaid.gov website.
- After completing the FAFSA, both parent and student will be asked to input each FSA ID.
- Once the electronic signatures are accepted, the student will receive a confirmation number.
- Mississippi State will receive an electronic copy of the student's FAFSA within seven business days.
- Regularly check the student myState account for FAFSA updates.

To receive maximum consideration for financial aid, it is critical for parents and students to submit the FAFSA and any required supporting documentation on or before April 1, 2022. The earlier a student submits the documents, the better chances he or she will have for available grants and work-study opportunities.

IMPORTANT FACTS ABOUT FAFSA

Remember that some federal supplemental grants and institutional grants have limited funding and may be depleted by the time late applications are received. If the deadline is missed, any financial aid for which the student does qualify may not be finalized by the time classes start in the fall.

The Federal School Code is **002423** when listing Mississippi State University as the institution to receive the FAFSA results.

The student is responsible for periodically checking the FAFSA website regarding the application status or processing problems notifications. Status checks may be made 24 hours a day, seven days a week through myState using the MSU NetID and NetPassword.

Once admitted to MSU and after FAFSA results and other required documents have been received, MSU's Student Financial Aid Department will determine the student's eligibility for aid and process an award. The student will be prompted by letter and/or e-mail to complete the online MSU Award Notification Letter.

STATE AID

Student aid from the State of Mississippi is for Mississippi residents only. (ex. Mississippi Resident Tuition Assistance Grant, Mississippi Eminent Scholars Grant, Nissan Scholarship Program (March 1 deadline), H.E.L.P. Program.) Complete the application as soon as possible after October 1 each year for the coming school year with application deadlines of March 31 and September 15. Apply online at **msfinancialaid.org**.

Students must earn 15 hours to be eligible for the following state aid programs:

- Higher Education Legislative Plan for Needy Students Scholarship (HELP)
- Mississippi Resident Tuition Assistance Grant (MTAG)
- Mississippi Eminent Scholars Grant (MESG)
- Law Enforcement Officers and Firemen Scholarship (LAW)

The Mississippi Office of Student Financial Aid in Jackson will communicate with Mississippi students that submit an online state-aid application regarding proof of residency documentation, other required documents and state aid award amounts. For additional information, telephone 1.800.327.2980.

FINALIZE THE AWARD

Entering students will receive an "Informational" award notification that will display initial awards that have been processed. The award recipient will be directed to myState to log in using his or her MSU NetID and NetPassword. The final step involves accepting or declining the awards and completing the online Supplemental Information Form.

RECEIVING FINANCIAL AID

Even after completing all FAFSA paperwork and receiving an award notice, a student is not yet done with the financial aid process. Some final steps include:

- A requirement for first-time recipients of a federal student loan to complete online entrance counseling that basically outlines what the loan is meant for, and responsibilities that the student must now manage the account. Go to **studentaid.gov** to complete the Stafford Entrance Loan Counseling.
- For first-time students borrowing with a Federal Direct Stafford Loan, there is a requirement to complete and submit a Master Promissory Note. Parents may also be required to complete a similar form for the Federal Direct PIUS Loan.
- Grant, scholarship, and loan funds typically are available at the beginning of each semester. As mentioned previously, work-study funds are earned and students are paid twice per month for the hours actually worked during the previous pay period.

LOSS OF AID AWARDS

To keep from losing some aid awards, a student must maintain satisfactory academic progress and meet other renewal guidelines. In addition to maintaining a minimum grade-point average, this would include not withdrawing from too many classes and passing a minimum number of courses.

Students receiving financial aid who withdraw or drop courses during a semester may have to repay funds already received. In some cases, educational award funding from external sources, other than those shown in the award letter, may cause what is known as an "over award" that results in a reduction or cancellation of federal, state or institutional awards previously provided.

TUITION AND REQUIRED FEES

Tuition is the basic, comprehensive, multi-purpose charge all students must pay as a condition for enrollment. Tuition and required fees cover the costs of education, as well as some student services and facility operations. To view current tuition and fee rates, visit paymybill.msstate.edu.

ACCOUNT BILLING

MSU provides a consolidated, online billing statement around the 15th of each month, with a payment due date of the 1st of the following month. Payment due dates for each term:

Fall Term: August 1Spring Term: January 1Summer Term: July 1

IMPORTANT: Before classes begin, students must pay the full balance on their account (net of aid), or be enrolled in a payment plan. Otherwise, their class schedule will be subject to cancellation.



QUIKPAY® - AUTHORIZED PAYERS

QuikPAY® is an online service that allows students to make payments, enroll in a payment plan, review their monthly billing statement, and review their account transactions. The QuikPAY® system is available 24/7/365.

QuikPAY® allows students to authorize a payer (usually a parent) to access account information and make payments on their behalf. Students must initiate the process, and the authorized payer will complete the process. When complete, the authorized payer will have a log in name and password, and be able to access the system directly at quikpayasp.com/msstate/studentaccounts/authorized.do.

In addition to monthly email notifications, you may receive billing statement notifications via SMS text messaging by updating "User Preferences" in the QuikPAY® system.

QUIKPAY® - MAKING PAYMENTS

To make a payment, log in to the QuikPAY® system, select "View and Pay Accounts", click "Make a Payment", enter payment amount, and then select "Payment Method". You may select credit card, e-check or Flywire (international payments). Students and authorized payers may save a profile of their credit/debit card and e-check information for future use.

ACCOUNT REFUNDS

Student refunds are issued in one of two ways:

e-Refund (Direct Deposit) to a student's checking or savings account. This is the preferred refund method because it is fast, safe, and easy to set-up. e-Refunds are processed on a daily basis. A confirmation email will be sent to your student's msstate.edu email address. Bank account information must be updated whenever an account change has been made. Failure to update this information may result in a delay of your student's e-Refund

Paper check refunds are processed weekly. Checks are mailed to the student's home address on file with the university.

HOW/WHEN IS FINANCIAL AID APPLIED TO MY ACCOUNT?

Financial aid is applied to the student account as soon as it is available in the system. Financial aid will be presented in one of two ways: (1) Pending or (2) Received.

Pending financial aid refers to aid that is still being processed, but it is far enough along that we take it into consideration when computing the amount owed on the student account. Pending aid is displayed separately on the student billing statement and in the QuikPAY® system.

Once pending aid has been completely processed, it will be disbursed to the student's account. Once disbursed, it will be displayed as a received payment on the billing statement and in the QuikPAY® system.

IMPORTANT: If pending aid is canceled or expires, the account balance will increase by the amount of the canceled/expired aid. Payment of account balances previously covered by canceled/expired aid will be due by the first day of the following month.

WHAT IS A 1098T TAX FORM AND WHERE CAN I GET ONE?

Internal Revenue Service (IRS) 1098T forms report the amount of payments applicable to qualified tuition related expenses and/or scholarships and grants applied to a student's account within the reporting calendar year. Students may access this information through the MSU myState portal by selecting the "Tax Relief Act Information" link or access their official 1098T form by logging in to heartland.ecsi.net. For more information about 1098T forms, visit paymybill.msstate.



MSU ID CARD

All MSU students may obtain their official university identification card through the Campus Card Office in 108 Allen Hall. The card should be carried at all times since it is required for a variety of important services, including meal plans, residence hall access, admissions to certain athletic events, class attendance tracking, and accessing MSU accounts with Account Services.

WHAT HAPPENS IF A STUDENT LOSES HIS OR HER MSU ID CARD?

When an MSU ID card is lost or stolen, a student should immediately report it by contacting the Campus Card Office at 662.325.3387 or, after business hours, the MSU Police Department at 662.325.2121. The MSU ID card will then be deactivated and become useless to anyone. To obtain a new MSU ID card, visit the Campus Card Office as soon as possible in 108 Allen Hall. A replacement fee will be charged.

HOW CAN I MAKE A PAYMENT?

Information regarding payment and payment plans can be viewed at **paymybill.msstate. edu**. All payments to MSU require a student's NetID or MSU ID number. Payments are accepted as follows:

- Online through QuikPAY®: e-check and credit/debit cards (MasterCard, Discover, American Express, and Visa) Note: Credit/debit card payments are assessed an additional 2.7% service/ convenience fee and are accepted online only. e-Checks are free of any additional fees.
- In-person at Garner Hall: cash, check, and money order
- Mail: check and money order
- Telephone: e-check

SOFTWARE

MSU policy requires that all computers accessing the University network have anti-virus software installed. There are several anti-virus applications available at no cost for student use. Windows Defender is the anti-virus application included with the Windows operating system. Cisco Immunet is another anti-virus option for Windows computers and is free for personal use. Sophos Home Free, also free for personal use, has both Windows and Mac versions.

Students may download software such as Microsoft Office, SPSS, SAS, Autocad, and others at no cost from servicedesk. msstate.edu/software. In addition, students may download a copy of the Microsoft Windows 10 Education Operating System at no cost from OnTheHub at msstate.onthehub.com. Other discounted software is available to students through Barnes & Noble's campus e-store at thinkEDU.com/BN.

NETWORK CREDENTIALS

NetID

Each MSU student is issued a unique electronic network identifier, or NetlD, which is used to access a variety of MSU information technology systems and services on the campus network

NetPassword

A NetPassword is used in conjunction with a NetID when logging in to MSU information technology systems and services. The NetPassword website, **netpassword.msstate.edu**, is used to:

- Set an initial NetPassword prior to logging in to MSU information technology systems and services for the first time
- Change a NetPassword periodically to keep it secure
- Reset a forgotten NetPassword

Duo

Duo is MSU's two-factor authentication, 2FA, application which adds another layer of security when logging in to MSU information technology systems and services. The first factor required to log in is something you know, i.e. your NetlD/NetPassword log in. The second factor is something you have, typically your smartphone or tablet. Therefore, even if a hacker is able to get your NetlD/NetPassword, they should not be able to log in to your account because they do not have your second log in. For more information visit **2fa.msstate.edu**.

MSU ID Card

The MSU ID card is key to accessing goods and services, including MoneyMate, meal plans, residence hall door access, sporting events and electronic class attendance.

NETWORK CONNECTIVITY

Access to the MSU network and all its resources is provided via wired Ethernet ports in all major buildings and residence halls and by comprehensive wireless coverage. Students with a laptop are encouraged to have the necessary hardware for both wired and wireless connectivity. Although wireless access is convenient, a wired connection is significantly faster and more reliable. Residence halls have high-speed Ethernet ports. Each port can accommodate a single computer. To take advantage of this high-speed network connection, students must have an Ethernet adapter in their computer and an Ethernet patch cable. This cable, which is not the same as a phone cord, connects the Ethernet adapter in the computer to one of the room's Ethernet ports.

Wireless Network Connectivity

Full 802.11 a/g/n/ac wireless network coverage is available. Instructions on configuring a laptop for the MSU wireless network, eduroam, are available on the ITS website at servicedesk.msstate.edu/eduroam. Also, alternative wireless network authentication methods are available for consumer devices, such as gaming consoles, in residence halls. Instructions on configuring consumer devices for the MSU wireless network are available on the ITS Service Desk website.

Network Quarantine

At times, it becomes necessary to isolate a computer from the campus network in order to protect the integrity of the network. This typically happens when a computer is infected with a virus or is used for illegal sharing of music or movies. Students whose machines are quarantined are presented with a description of the problem when they try to use the network and are typically given the opportunity to fix the problem themselves. Repeat offences or violations of a severe nature can result in a referral to the Dean of Students' Office. Organizations such as the Recording Industry Association of America and the Motion Picture Association of America spend a great deal of effort in the investigation of music and movie piracy and students are cautioned to avoid such illegal activities.

myState

myState, MSU's web portal, offers single sign-on access to systems and services such as Banner, Canvas, eForms, and information security training. myState is available at my.msstate.edu or through the myState link located in the upper right portion of the MSU home page, msstate.edu.

myState Mobile

The myState Mobile app is available at no cost for both iOS and Android devices. The app provides access to general information such as campus maps and directions, shuttle routes, and the campus directory. Students may log in to the app with their NetlD and NetPassword to gain access to additional information and services such as class schedules, grades, account balances, and payment options. The myState mobile app is available from the Apple App Store and the Google Play Store.

myBanner

myBanner allows students access to a number of services including registration, academic records, financial aid and scholarship information, account information, enrollment verification, and personal information. myBanner is available within the myState portal by selecting the Banner page from sidebar menu. The myState portal sidebar menu is available by clicking the menu icon in the upper left portion of the browser window.

Canvas

Canvas is the learning management system (LMS) used in the delivery of online instruction at MSU. Canvas is accessed through the myState portal by selecting the Classroom page from the sidebar menu or by going to canvas.msstate.edu.

Canvas Student Mobile App

The Canvas Student Mobile app allows access to Canvas courses from mobile devices. The app allows students to view grades and course content, submit assignments, keep track of course work, send and receive messages, post to discussion groups, and watch videos. The app is available at no cost for iOS and Android devices from the Apple App Store and the Google Play Store.

Parent Portal

Students can give parents and others access to view a summary of their academic information including class schedule, grades, absences, account balance, financial aid, and meal plan use. To grant someone access to the Parent Portal, click the F.E.R.P.A. Release & Parent Portal Access link in the Academic Records drop-down menu under myBanner for Students on the Banner page in the myState portal.

Microsoft 365 - Student Email

Outlook

The university assigns every student an official email address of netid@msstate.edu and uses this email address for official communication with students. It is important that students regularly check their Microsoft 365 email (Outlook) and maintain it in good working order. To access Microsoft 365, select Microsoft 365 from the sidebar menu of the myState portal or browse to m365.msstate.edu.

Open Computer Labs

Open computer labs are available for student use in Mitchell Memorial Library. These open labs have both Mac and Windows computers, as well as laser printers. Charges for printing are automatically assessed and posted to the student's Banner account. Rates for printing, as well as operating hours and other information, can be found at servicedesk.msstate.edu/labs.



- Grant Parent Portal access as appropriate.
- Never open email attachments from unknown people/senders and look out for potential phishes and scams.

CHOOSING OR CHANGING A MAJOR

Eighty percent of students entering higher education admit uncertainty about the academic area in which they wish to major—sometimes, even after having declared one. As proof, consider that 50 percent will change their major at least once before graduation; some, several times. Should your student either be undecided about or considering changing a major, the following strategies may help.

ENCOURAGE YOUR STUDENT TO GET TO KNOW THE MAJORS AT MSU

Begin by briefly surveying the list of all MSU majors, including degree requirements and course descriptions, found at catalog.

MAKE SURE THEY TALK TO PEOPLE "IN THE KNOW"

Talk to people "in the know." Every major has an academic advisor or undergraduate coordinator who can answer questions about degree offerings and requirements. Coordinators also have names of graduating seniors who will share their firsthand knowledge of a particular course of study.

ADVISE YOUR STUDENT TO TAKE CAREER ASSESSMENTS

Take advantage of several career assessments available at the Career Center to help gain a better focus on major options based on individual interests, personality, and related factors.

SUGGEST THAT YOUR STUDENT MEET WITH A CAREER ADVISOR

While at the center, ask to meet with a career advisor. These staff members are available throughout the school year to provide guidance in navigating the entire process.

CARFFR CENTER SERVICES AND EVENTS

CONNECTIONS

Connections, the Career Center job portal, is designed to connect students to employers, job opportunities and career related events. After logging in your student may:

- Search for part-time, full-time, internship, federal work-study, and student worker postings
- Schedule campus interviews
- Post résumés and research employers
- Keep up with upcoming dates and related details about campus career fairs and information sessions

CAREER-PLANNING CLASSES

Career-planning classes are available for undecided students. COE 1323/ Academic and Career Planning is a three-credit-hour course providing a step-by-step approach for choosing a major, focusing on career assessments, major and career research and informational interviews.

CAREER CENTER EVENTS

Career Center events take place each semester to provide students with the opportunity to interact and network with potential employers, as well as representatives of graduate schools and other organizations.

ON-CAMPUS INTERVIEWING

PART-TIME JOB SEARCH

Finding a part-time job while attending school may often be a challenge. Here are some helpful tips:

- · Attend the Part-Time Jobs Fair.
- Visit Connections, the Career Center's iob portal.
- Visit campus departments that may be hiring, including Dining Services, Facilities Management, Housing and Residence Life, Mitchell Memorial Library, and the Sanderson Center.
- Visit local businesses, restaurants, and retailers.
- As appropriate, utilize friend and family networks.

HELPFUL JOB-HUNTING HINTS:

Check your résumé carefully.

Complete a careful résumé review to make certain there are no typographical errors and all contact information is current.

Dress the part.

While some jobs may not require business attire, it is always important to look and act professional when meeting with potential employers. (In-person or virtually)

Know your academic schedule.

Being knowledgeable about your class schedule allows you to inform employers about possible class schedule changes you can make to meet their needs.

Be confident.

Confidence during the interview process begins with a firm handshake, established and maintained eye contact, and a constant smile.

Stay positive.

Campus departments are not required to post open positions on the Connections site. Look for a job both on and off campus.

4-D ROADMAP TO CAREER READINESS

Our 4D Roadmap to Career Readiness is based off David Cooperider's 4D Model of Appreciative Inquiry and provides students with resources wherever they find themselves in the career development process.

DISCOVER YOUR STRENGTHS

If a student is questioning their major or career goals, we encourage them to explore ways to discover their interests, strengths, skills, talents and values and how they might fit in their future. This may include:

- Taking career assessments like the STRONG Interest Inventory
- Getting familiar with Connections and completing their profile

DEVELOP YOUR DREAM

When developing their dream into a reality, students will begin interviewing, job shadowing, and volunteering. This means they may:

- Join and actively participate in on-campus professional organizations
- Conduct informational interviews
- Seek volunteer and job shadowing opportunities
- Attend a career fair and other career related events

DESIGN YOUR PATH

To design their desired path to career satisfaction, students will start utilizing resources such as professional documents, social media, and Experiential Learning. They may also be encouraged to:

- Write a résumé and cover letter
- Create a LinkedIn profile
- Design career search strategies
- Practice interviewing skills
- Seek part-time, internship, and co-op opportunities
- Prepare for Grad School Applications [Statement of Purpose/entrance exams]
- Utilize resources including Connections, CareerShift, and GoinGlobal

DELIVER YOUR TALENTS

Once students are ready to start demonstrating and delivering their professionalism, they will apply different strategies and resources to ensure they are truly career ready. They will begin to:

- Tailor their résumé and cover letter to specific applications
- Customize their LinkedIn profile to goals
- Schedule a mock interview
- Participate in on-campus interviews and networking opportunities.



FAMILY ASSISTANCE WITH CAREER DEVELOPMENT

ENCOURAGE YOUR STUDENT TO VISIT THE CAREER CENTER

Provide assurance that meeting with a career advisor may take place at any point while in school.

ADVISE YOUR STUDENT TO WRITE A RÉSUMÉ

Recommend preparation of a résumé; visit our site for reference.

CHALLENGE YOUR STUDENT TO BECOME "OCCUPATIONALLY LITERATE"

Students should complete a personal assessment and research various interesting career fields and employers.

ALLOW YOUR STUDENT TO MAKE THE DECISION

Keep in mind that the sudden change in an academic major is not unusual. Also, don't fret when what seems as an outrageous or impractical career idea is broached. Even though you may not agree with the decision, parental patience, sympathy, and understanding are critical at this point.

EXPOSE YOUR STUDENT TO THE WORLD OF WORK

Understand that most his or her age tend to have a stereotypical view of the workplace.

EMPHASIZE THE IMPORTANCE OF EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING

Change to: Internships, Cooperative Education (Co-op), Job Shadowing, Externships, Program Capstone Classes, Service Based Learning, and other forms of Experiential Learning expose students to real-life, on-the-job training and exposes them to potential employers.

ENCOURAGE EXTRACURRICULAR INVOLVEMENT

Interpersonal and leadership skills, qualities valued by future employers, are often developed while participating in extracurricular activities.

PERSUADE YOUR STUDENT TO STAY UP-TO-DATE WITH CURRENT EVENTS

Students should know what is going on around them. Worldly knowledge about current events will help students make connections with potential employers.

TEACH THE VALUE OF NETWORKING

Recommend contacts in your own personal and professional networks that may have information on summer or part-time jobs. Encourage the "shadowing" of someone in the workplace as a way to increase awareness of an interesting career field

HELP THE CAREER CENTER

Help the Career Center by making contact whenever your place of employment has an appropriate job opening. If your business hires interns, list the internship information with the Career Center.

WHAT IS COOPERATIVE EDUCATION (CO-OP)?

As a special academic program allowing students to obtain "real world" experience related to their field of study while still in school, it involves alternating work semesters with school semesters. After completing three work semesters, most students should have gained 52 weeks of work experience before graduation.

While at work, students retain their full-time student status; scholarships, insurance, and school loans are not affected. A 2.5 minimum overall grade-point average is required to participate. Freshmen are eligible to begin work after two semesters at MSU and transfer students, after one semester.

WHAT IS AN INTERNSHIP?

Usually occurring during the summer but also during regular academic periods, it is a paid or unpaid full-time, practical work experience for one to two semesters. While the work may involve a specific project based on the company's need, it should be related to the student's professional interest and/or major. As with the Cooperative Education Program, interning students maintain full-time enrollment status, with scholarships, insurance, and school loans unaffected. Requirements to participate are based on the type of internship, but for Professional Practice, 60+ semester hours must be completed with a minimum 2.75 GPA. For congressional, Disney, and Career Center internships, students must have full-time status and good academic standing with the university.

THE COMPETITIVE EDGE.

Successful employment most often is the primary goal for students after graduation. In today's economy, however, dedicated study and good grades no longer are enough. To gain a competitive edge, students must have accumulated practical work experience related to their major field of study. That "edge" is something employers desire in new hires; having it can make the difference in pre-graduation job searches.

INTERNATIONAL SERVICES OFFICE

Designed to serve the international student and scholar community in their regulatory compliance obligations with both the federal government and Mississippi State University.

STUDENT AND EXCHANGE VISITORS SYSTEM

The Student and Exchange Visitor System (SEVIS) is the system that the United States Citizenship and Immigration Service (USCIS) implemented for electronic reporting and record keeping as dictated by a 1996 law. I-20 (document for F status and DS-2019 forms (document for J status) are prepared using SEVIS. Individuals needing F-1, F-2, J-1 or J-2 status must have their information entered into SEVIS. The International Services office on campus is the primary unit with the ability to enter records into SEVIS, but the student/scholar/dependent has a legal obligation to report some of the information to IS. The USCIS says that it is still the non-immigrant's responsibility to make sure that he/she stays in compliance with the laws at all times. The International Services office wants all MSU students and scholars to be able to focus on their studies and research so it is very important that you stay in contact with this office. In order to make sure all documents are in order, please visit International Services before planning any out of the country trips for yourself or your family members.

The following events require that you inform the International Services office in order to retain legal status in the United States.

- Change of address All changes of address for students and their dependents must be reported within 10 days of moving.
 Even if you are just moving down the hall to a different room in the residence hall, you must inform International Services of the change.
- Legal name change for the student or his/her dependents must be reported within 10 days.
- Any changes (major, funding, program dates, etc.) to the information listed on the I-20 or DS-2019.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENT RESOURCES

GENERAL DOCUMENTS

Passport

Keep passport valid. ISO recommends that students apply for renewal of their passport at least 6 months prior to expiration.

I-94

This document shows that you entered the country in a legal status. I-94 is now electronic and can be accessed through cbp.gov/194. I-94 should have your class of admission (F-1, J-1, etc.), the day you entered, and an expiration date. For F-1's and J-1's, the expiration should say D/S - Duration of Status - and means that you may remain in the U.S. as long as you continue to have a valid I-20/DS-2019 and pursue the objective listed on that particular document. Anyone who has a specific date written in the space for expiration should bring this to the attention of the International Services office. Any student who is unable to locate their I-94 or who have incorrect information on the 1-94 should meet with International Services to have it corrected.

I-20/DS-2019

This document shows program of study, finances, and start and end dates. End date is very important. If you will not graduate by the end date listed you must request a program extension prior to the expiration date. Visit international.msstate.edu for details.

VISA

- Required for entry into the U.S. except for Canadian citizens.
- Shows the dates, number of times, and purpose for which it can be used.
- Might expire while you are here and that is ok. It only needs to be valid at the time of each entry to the U.S.
- Renewal cannot be done within the U.S. Can only be done by application at a U.S. consulate/embassy. Highly recommended that the request be made in the home country.

GRACE PERIODS

The grace period refers to a period of time during which you are able to stay in the U.S. to prepare for departure or a change to another status. Employment is not allowed during the grace period.

60 days following graduation/completion of program objective

15 days after authorized (by International Services) withdrawal from the university 0 days for unauthorized withdrawal L-Status

30 days following graduation/completion of program objective

EMPLOYMENT

F-1 and J-1

- Work is limited to 20 hours per week while school is in session
- Work required for an assistantship counts toward the 20 hour limit
- Work hours may not be averaged to equal 20 hours per week
- Example: It is not ok to work 30 hours one week and 10 the next
- Work must be on campus
- May begin work before obtaining a

- social security number, but must have the social security number before first paycheck will be issued
- During official school breaks work may be full-time

ENROLLMENT REQUIREMENTS

Graduate F-1 or J-1 (9 hours each fall and spring term)

Undergraduate F-1 or J-1 (12 hours during each fall and spring term)

Exceptions to the above are limited and require permission from the International Services office. Examples include:

- Medical reasons must be documented and recommended by a doctor and approved by the International Service office.
- Summer sessions do not require full time enrollment unless your documentation reflects a summer start date.
- During the last semester of study only need to take what is required in order to graduate.

TRAVFI

- Must get travel signature from International Services on your particular document.
- For J's the travel signature must come from the office that issued the DS-2019.
- Check passport validity.
- Check visa validity. If your U.S. visa will expire prior to your planned reentry, you must be prepared to renew the visa during this trip. Visas cannot be renewed within the U.S.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENT RESOURCES

SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER (SSN)

Procedure - Obtaining evidence of on-campus employment from the employer and DSO

Letter from Employer

The SSA will accept a letter or statement from the F-1 student's employer if the F-1 student has not yet started working. An original signature is required and the signatory's title should be shown on the letter. The statement may be typed or written on school letterhead. The statement will contain the employer's name, name of student and the nature of the student's on-campus job.

DSO Activation

New students who need to obtain an SSN for an on-campus job, must first ensure that their SEVIS record has been activated. Once the record is activated, a student can then apply for the number. Students who have been enrolled at MSU for at least 1 semester do not require this additional step.

Requirements for getting a SSN:

We suggest you wait until you are in the United States for at least 10 days before you apply for a Social Security number. Take the original documents (I-20, Passport, I-94, offer letter from the employer) and make sure you register for a full course load.

SAM D. HAMILTON NOXUBEE NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE

Located 13 miles south of Starkville, the 48,000-acre Sam D. Hamilton Noxubee Wildlife Refuge is home to bald eagles, alligators, red-cockaded woodpeckers, bobcats, wild turkeys and other animals native to the region. In addition to hunters and fishers, regular visitors include birdwatchers, hikers and photographers. The Refuge, as it's known to most, also has several nature trails and observation decks.

OTHER OUTDOOR RECREATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES

Also near Starkville are the John W. Starr Memorial Forest, an 8,200-acre natural woodlands park to the south; and the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway to the east that offers 1,000 miles of shoreline and 110,000 acres of land and water for fishing, boating, skiing, camping, hiking, and swimming.

DISTINCTIVE **DISTRICTS**

COTTON DISTRICT

Probably Starkville's most photographed area and a model for "New Urbanism" architecture, this area just off campus once included a collection of row houses and substandard residences associated with the neighborhood cotton mill. Today, it is filled with award-winning, brightly colored buildings evocative of Savannah, Charleston and New Orleans.

DOWNTOWN STARKVILLE starkville.org | 662.323.3322

The city's earliest identity as "Boardtown" disappeared with the massive sawmill and literal boardwalks, but Starkville has kept the flavor and character of its "boomtown" years around the turn of the 20th century. Well-preserved churches and the downtown 1925 Hotel Chester (on the National Register of Historic Places) add character and charm.

NASH STREET HISTORIC DISTRICT

MSU faculty and staff members built this neighborhood, Starkville's earliest subdivision, consisting of Tudor-Revival, bungalow and craftsman styles dating from the early- and mid-20th century.

GREENSBORO STREET HISTORIC DISTRICT

Cotton-hauling wagons that negotiated "Greensboro Road" on their way to the Tombigbee River were long gone by the time Starkville's prosperous merchants and professionals made Greensboro Street the address of choice for their Victorian, Tudor-Revival, bungalow and craftsman homes from the 1860s through the 1930s.

OVERSTREET HISTORIC DISTRICT

Houses built close to both downtown and Overstreet School (circa 1894) form Starkville's largest historic district. Overstreet homes range from ornate Queen Anne to mid-20th century craftsman and bungalow styles. An occasional cook's or smoke house found behind some main structures are reminders of another era. The district is bordered by Washington Street to the west, Wood Street to the south, South Montgomery to the east and Hogan Street to the north.





MAROON ALERT

The Maroon Alert System includes several methods of notifying the university community that an emergency exists or is developing. Maroon Alerts are only sent for emergencies or periodic tests. To learn more about the Maroon Alert System, contact the Office of Emergency Management: ready@msstate.edu or visit ready.msstate.edu.

MAROON ALERTS FOR THE UNIVERSITY

(INDIVIDUALS WITH A NETID & PASSWORD)

Mississippi State University faculty, staff, and students are encouraged to register for Maroon Alert and verify their contact information by following these steps:

Log in to my.msstate.edu with your MSU NetlD & NetPassword.

- Click the three bars on the left side of the page to open the menu.
- Click "Banner" and the click the "Personal Information" tab.
- Click "Update Your Maroon Alert Information" to verify your enrollment and contact information. You may also log into the Everbridge Portal to conduct a self-test
- Don't forget to log out of my.msstate.edu.

Please Note:

- It may take up to 24 hours for contact information updates to take effect.
- Cell phone numbers listed in the Maroon Alert System are not published in the directory and are only used for emergency notifications or periodic tests.

Delivery methods will include the Maroon Alert app (Everbridge), SMS text, university email, and a phone call. When an emergency exists, the Maroon Alert system will try to reach you through each of these methods. If you receive an alert and have moved to safety, confirm receipt of the alert so the system knows it was successfully delivered. This will stop further attempts to reach you with the same message.

Maroon Alert App from Everbridge

The Maroon Alert App from Everbridge is the fastest way to receive alerts. Search for Everbridge in your app store to get started. For installation and registration details, visit emergency. msstate.edu/app for installation and setup instructions.

MAROON ALERTS FOR THE COMMUNITY

Families and friends can sign up for Maroon Alert by texting "MAROONALERT" to 888777. This keyword is not case-sensitive. You will be enrolled in the Maroon Alert Community Engagement and will

receive a text from 888777 anytime an alert is issued. You may text "STOP" to 888777 at any time to be removed from the system.

Community members are also encouraged to follow @MaroonAlert on Twitter to receive advisory and emergency update information.

EMERGENCY WEBSITE

Visit ready.msstate.edu to learn more about the Maroon Alert System, preparedness tips, safety courses, and response steps. If an emergency exists, this site will be updated to provide the most current and detailed information.

During an emergency, Mississippi State University webpages will show a BLUE or YELLOW banner at the top of the page. This banner alerts visitors to the emergency status and will redirect to the Emergency Management homepage (ready.msstate.edu). A YELLOW banner indicates an emergency, while a BLUE banner is used for an advisory.

SOCIAL MEDIA

Maroon Alert uses social media to distribute alerts and important information. Follow @MaroonAlert on Twitter to receive important information and updates. Be sure to turn on notifications for @MaroonAlert posts.

OUTDOOR WARNING SIRENS

Sirens positioned throughout campus and Starkville may be used to warn campus. If the sirens are activated, seek safety immediately. Additional information will be shared through other Maroon Alert channels as soon as it becomes available. Sirens are tested at noon on the first Tuesday of each month, during clear weather.

OTHER NOTIFICATION METHODS

Maroon Alerts will be displayed on university desktop computers for up to 2 minutes or until the user acknowledges the message. Additionally, many digital displays across campus will be temporarily taken over to show alerts.

ACTIONS TO TAKE

If a Maroon Alert is issued for an emergency:

- Notify those around you. Make sure others received the alert. Their phones may be on silent or they may not be enrolled in the Maroon Alert system.
- Get to a safe place. If the danger or hazard is not near you, continue to stay in a safe place.
 If you feel you are not in a safe place, quickly and calmly get to safety.
- Stay safe and wait for updates/instructions. Follow @MaroonAlert further for instructions and monitor conditions. Do not share or retweet information unverified from sources.

The Mississippi State University Police Department (MSUPD) is dedicated to providing the campus community with the highest quality law enforcement and crime prevention services. In support of the university's overall academic mission, the MSUPD strives to perform a vital role in enhancing that mission.

The department's more than 34 sworn officers are certified through the Mississippi Law Enforcement Officers' Training Academy and hold constable powers under authority of state statute. The MSUPD has jurisdiction for enforcement of institutional rules and regulations and State of Mississippi laws on all university-owned, -rented or -leased properties.

SAFE WALK

Safe Walk is a 24/7 service operated by the MSUPD to safely escort individuals to their vehicles, buildings or other campus destinations. Telephone or text 662.325.2121 and an escort will be sent to walk students to their destination. Safe Walk members are equipped with two-way radios and wear reflective vests. At night, patrol members travel throughout campus in golf carts to provide extra sets of eyes and ears for officers on duty and report any activity that may require law enforcement response. Hours of operation vary but the generally begin at dark and continue until the early morning hours.

WEAPON POSSESSION

While MSU understands that many are hunters, its students should be aware that possession of any weapon on campus represents a serious concern. Under most circumstances, possession violates both university policy and state law. Because it is a felony, any student found in possession within campus boundaries may be subject to arrest and confiscation of the weapon. Additionally, an arrested student may immediately be suspended from classes, pending a disciplinary hearing.

ALCOHOL & ILLEGAL DRUGS

Mississippi State prohibits the unlawful possession, use or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol on university property. Any student failing to observe these policies will be subject to institutional sanctions in accordance with established disciplinary procedures including suspension or expulsion. In addition to university sanctions, a student found in violation of the drug and alcohol policy may be referred to the appropriate authorities for prosecution. Under local, state and federal laws, legal sanctions may include fine, imprisonment or both.
